Dr. John Loxley is a professor in the Department of Economics, University of Manitoba. He specializes in International Money and Finance, International Development and Community Economic Development and has published extensively in these areas.

He has served as an economic advisor to a number of governments, such as the incoming Mandela government of South Africa, and the government of Manitoba, as well as several international institutions.

In 2005 he was elected to the Royal Society of Canada. In May 2008 he was the recipient of the Distinguished Academic Award granted by the Canadian Association of University Teachers and in May 2010 he was awarded the Galbraith Prize in Economics and Social Justice by the Progressive Economists' Forum of Canada.

He has researched public-private partnerships for almost fifteen years and recently published *Public Service Private Profits: The Political Economy of Public-Private Sector Partnerships*, with Salim J. Loxley, Fernwood Publishers, 2010.
